#### From the Rector's Desk

### Dear Friends,

I was shaken. To my core. I had to pull the car over. I had just run a red light. I have never done that before. I just ran a red light. "+###)\*&@#\$\$%^&\*" Several very non-priestly words came out of my mouth. Luckily, I didn't kill anyone. But I could have. My life – as any of us have known it – would have been over. That was several weeks ago. However, since then, and as recently as of writing today, I have seen three folks in front of me do the same thing. At high speeds on Route 31. Three more times, when I had never seen that ever in my life! It's not the right on red or ignoring the no turn-around sign. No. Full on. Running right through the red light.

SO.

This is a wake-up call. Take your frigging phone – as I do now – and throw it in the back seat.

Throw it in the trunk. Turn it off and save power. Take out the phone-holding device clipped in your a/c vent – take it out and throw it in your trunk.\* Take the charger cord you use to charge your phone and throw it in the trunk. Or less severe, plug in your turned-off phone and chuck it on the passenger side floor where you can't reach it. And if you find yourself reeling it in to answer a call, pull over and write a check to the local first aid squad members who would have to come to scrape up the remains of the pedestrian you hit.

### **SERIOUSLY**

Your life will be over if you screw up in this way. I love you and I just don't want to get that call. That call would be devastating to make and devastating to hear.

### WE ARE ALL DISTRACTED

With Covid-19, BLM protests (and I would imagine another march will take place soon because of the recent, deeply troubling news that Hunterdon Central students "playfully" took a picture of themselves re-enacting the death of George Floyd (#\$\$%&\*\*%%# – more unpriestly language ensued), and then there's the national election. Taken together, with the hyper reliance on our handheld technology, we are fully and full-time distracted. Let us be plain and honest with ourselves. WE ARE DISTRACTED!

#### **THEREFORE**

When you start your car, pray. Get mindful. People's lives are in your hands. The pace and pulse and frequent panic of our current life must be renounced. I beg all of us. Life in Christ is quiet, restful, decent, humble, fulfilling, and meaningful. Our cell phones are frauds; certainly deadly frauds when they distract us from the care needed to launch the lethal weapons we call cars and trucks.

Sorry for the intensity, but I'm hoping this will save lives.

A couple of notes regarding our finances:

- This report does not include income from the Auction as it was held in September (see page 5)
- Upon the urging of the Diocese we applied for and received \$29,200 in PPP funds. Since there is no formal way to fill out the paperwork to ask for forgiveness on this "loan" yet, we are not listing it as income and treating it like a liability until we are granted the forgiveness.
- Once the auction proceeds have added and we know that the PPP loan has been forgiven, our net number should be trending positive.

Thank you to all of parishioners who added CHS as their charity in the Amazon Smile program. We received our first payment in August. We had signed up with Amazon in the spring so we are excited to have received some funds.

### The Only Way Through is Through

Dear Friends,

1 am asking for assistance to develop our worship life in a hybrid environment.

With great technical help and generous donations, we are becoming more adept at broadcasting our worship over the internet and integrating those at home with those who come to in-person worship.

We are slowly creeping up the learning curve and all of you have been most patient. Every week we seem to experience an unanticipated technical breakdown. This can add to the helplessness of the moment. However, with constancy and devotion, we lumber on.

That said, we are looking to bounce forward, not merely bounce back.

Even when the pandemic is over, hybrid worship is here for good. The reality is that there will never be another "snow day." (Sorry kids- school ain't never gonna be canceled again!) There will be Sunday worship, even on bad weather days, because there will always be internet broadcasts, even if from my "basement chapel!"

So who's up for helping? We will begin with a creative conversation on Zoom, of course. Date announced to those who respond directly to me.

In the short run, we are also looking for vocalists to join our merry band — we are healthfully separated using mics in different spaces safely for all concerned. It is our good fortune to have a modern worship space that allows for safe public worship. AND remember, as always, no one should feel in any way pressured to worship here at Haytown Road. Please stay home as only you can know best. With folks only singing along softly in their masks, it's nice to have a PA system sharing the lyrics with a few voices, and if we had some harmony there, it would be great. In the future, post-pandemic world, we're still going to want to broadcast hymn singing for those at home, so we are not just filling in temporarily. This is a long term adaptation. And it will grow the mission of this church.

Pardon for the bluntness here, but I know the world sucks right now — for a bunch of reasons and all at once. Some days I just want to pull the covers up and hide. But we must rally, as we are able. I have no idea what a "choir" looks like in the future. One will have to be rebuilt here, among other things. Our worship will need to emphasize the power and resilience of what a common life in Christ can build in the midst of chaos and calamity. Resolve. Mindfulness. Courage. Tenacity. How are these exhibited in our gatherings, our common prayers and ritual actions? The unity of being one body in Christ is threatened. The integrity of the witness of Jesus in the Gospels is put to the test and some are understandably confused by disparate messengers. The Church has been here before. We stand amid the long train of the faithful before us, who lived through Nero, Caligula, and Diocletian, any number of plagues, the Dark Ages, and more. We are reminded of their faithfulness and steadfast hope during times of peril.

So for those who want a stake in the shape of this worshipping life, give me a shout. As goes worship, so too outreach, and stewardship, and formation — all of it. All of it (us) will be bouncing forward. We might not know what reshaping our ministries will look like except that they will all look more like Christ.

The only way through is through.

With few costs, and a lot less work than a live auction, our Virtual Auction achieved the financial goal set by the Finance Committee.

I want to thank everyone who donated their time, talent and treasure. Congratulations to all the successful bidders—you won some great gifts! I especially wish to thank Alex Van Veldhuisen for a remarkable job in keeping the auction on track and getting bidders to keep going! And none of this would have happened without support from Fr. Phil, Eva Lesniak and June Filipski—my gratitude for all you did to support this effort and keep me on track.

# To the Women of Edna Mahan: Letters from CHS June 2020

In the Name of one God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Peace and grace to you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We at the Church of the Holy Spirit want you to know that we miss being with you and we pray for your safety and the safety of all of the inmates, Corrections Officers, Chaplains, the Administration and all of the other staff.

We miss the inspirational work that the members of the Shawl Ministry do by making shawls for those who are ill or who have suffered loss.

We miss your deep faith and thirst for God that we experience at the Bible Study sessions.

At times such as these we are reminded of how Jesus felt abandoned in the Garden of Gethsemane and asked his Father to "remove this cup from me", but he went on and told his Father "yet, not what I want, but what you want." After suffering torture, He was crucified and He called out from the cross "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" This incredibly human feeling of being abandoned and alone in a frightening time is one we all share and it brings us closer to Jesus. But, God did not abandon His Son and He will not abandon us. As St Paul writes to the Christians in Rome We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed.

In many ways, we live the passion of Christ every day. Paul says: We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body. The one who bore our human frame, knows us in the deepest ways, and we carry Him within us also in the deepest ways and at the darkest of times. You are all God's beloved ones and He is with you in this difficult time.

The wonderful poet and writer Maya Angelou said: "You may not control all the events that happen to you, but you can decide not to be reduced by them." And "I've learned that no matter what happens, or how bad it seems today, life does go on, and it will be better tomorrow." And "Listen to yourself and in that quietude you might hear the voice of God."

Paul reminds us that on the listening and hearing the voice of God we can be empowered to live in holiness: Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

Frida Kahlo the 20th-century Mexican painter said: "At the end of the day, we can endure much more than we think we can."

Finally Mother Teresa said: "Spread love everywhere you go. Let no one ever come to you without leaving happier."

In this time of darkness open yourself to God's unerring love, trust in that love and spread that love to those around you. Until we meet again, may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing through the power of the Holy Spirit.

### Summer 2020

In the name of one God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Peace and grace to you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

It has been just about four months since the state-wide stay-at-home order brought a jarring halt to the Edna Mahan Shawl Ministry and Bible study sessions of the Church of the Holy Spirit. It is hard to over-state how much we miss these *mutual* ministries and the strength we drew from them, as we learned from one another about grace under pressure, humility, true repentance, and the joy of believing. As the days of this frightening pandemic roll one into another, it is natural to turn to the Scriptures for inspiration or solace.

The weekly Bible study group at CHS asks two important questions about the Gospel passages we read: How is God speaking to us through these verses, and how is God asking us to change? No answers can be found for these questions without the support of prayer, meditation, and trust in God.

The words of PSALM 27: 1-8 come to the minds of many of us in difficult times. Though the enemy the psalmist mentions is other people, the words are appropriate for all kinds of trouble – even a tiny, but vicious, virus. As you read these stirring verses, think about how God may be asking you to change – or grow – even during a deadly pandemic.

The LORD is my light and my salvation—so why should I be afraid?

The LORD is my fortress, protecting me from danger, so why should I tremble?

When evil people come to devour me, when my enemies and foes attack me,

they will stumble and fall.

Though a mighty army surrounds me, my heart will not be afraid.

Even if I am attacked, I will remain confident.

The one thing I ask of the LORD — the thing I seek most— is to live in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, delighting in the LORD's perfections and meditating in his Temple.

For he will conceal me there when troubles come; he will hide me in his sanctuary.

He will place me out of reach on a high rock.

Then I will hold my head high above my enemies who surround me.

At his sanctuary I will offer sacrifices with shouts of joy, singing and praising the LORD with music.

Hear me as I pray, O LORD. Be merciful and answer me!

My heart has heard you say, "Come and talk with me."

and my heart responds, "LORD, I am coming."

The call, to set aside fear and supplant it with confidence and even singing and shouts of joy, is the most obvious message. God wants a conversation with us. Could it be that God wants us to use this break from the ordinary to renew and deepen our faith – to banish fear from our *hearts* and listen with our *hearts* to what God wants to tell us? We invite you to prayerfully ponder this wonderful psalm and its promise that only in God can we live in safety.

### October 2020

When Father Phil and John Andrews spoke to Dr. Lynch about communicating with you wonderful women in a monthly homily, I volunteered enthusiastically, since it presented an opportunity to reach out to friends I have missed so much during the quarantine. I must admit my own sense of humility — about interpreting the Word of God in a way that would bring comfort and meaning to you. But recently, I was so moved by this lovely message from White Eagle (she is a member of the Native American Hopi tribe). I believe it is perfect to share. It brought me peace and I hope her words will do the same for you.

"This moment humanity is going through can now be seen as a portal and as a hole. The decision to fall into the hole or go through the portal is up to you.

"If you repent of the problem and consume the news 24 hours a day, with little energy, nervous all the time, with pessimism, you will fall into the hole. But if you take this opportunity to look at yourself, rethink life and death, take care of yourself and others, you will cross the portal. Take care of your space, take care of your body. Connect with your spiritual House.

"When you are taking care of yourselves, you are taking care of everything else. Do not lose the spiritual dimension of this crisis; have the eagle aspect from above and see the whole; see more broadly.

"There is a social demand in this crisis, but there is also a spiritual demand -- the two go hand in hand. Without the social dimension, we fall into fanaticism. But without the spiritual dimension, we fall into pessimism and lack of meaning. You were prepared to go through this crisis. Take your toolbox and use all the tools available to you.

"You do not help at all by being sad and without energy, for it is through joy that one resists. Also, when the storm passes, each of you will be very important in the reconstruction of this new world. You need to be well and strong. And for that, there is no other way than to maintain a beautiful, happy, and bright spirit.

"This is what is asked of [us]: Allow yourself to take advantage of this time to perform your vision-seeking rituals. What world do you want to build for you? For now, this is what you can do – be serenity in the storm. Calm down, pray every day. Establish a routine to meet the sacred in the everyday.

"Good things spring forth; what you emanate — how you shine — is the most important thing. And sing, dance, resist through art, joy, faith, and love."


