From the Rector's Desk

Our Trumpeter editor suggested I write up a homily offered in the beginning of summer. Rereading it just now, I am still feeling it.

Out of the blue, with no warning, I received the following:

Email exchange edited for confidentiality entitled Apology and Gratitude, dated 6/7/21

Dear Rev. Carr Jones,

My family (my spouse, children and myself) were briefly members of your church around 2004. You were kind enough to come bless our new house though I would understand if

you do not remember us. This was not too long after the Episcopal Church ordained the first openly gay Bishop. Although I did not openly oppose the ordination of Bishop Robinson, at that time I thought it was divisive and likely for my own comfort, wished it hadn't happened. I also thought, at that time, that your attitude was unduly harsh toward people who did oppose it. For that reason we left your church though we stayed with the Episcopal Church. We moved out of New Jersey many years ago.

I am writing to tell you that you were right and I was wrong. I was wrong to expect our LGBTQ fellow parishioners and friends to accept those who do not accept them. I was wrong to expect a kind of "don't ask, don't tell" situation in church, a place where acceptance and love should be the minimum standard. You were right to insist that everyone in your church welcome our friends no matter who they are.

Many years ago my youngest child convinced me of the importance of acceptance and equal rights for all people. I apologize for my attitude and my behavior in leaving and I thank you for your fine example and for your courage. I know better now and I am trying to do better and be better.

Most sincerely yours."

My response follows [Email entitled "Gratitude and Blessings" dated 6/8/21]

Friend,

Your kind, generous and surprising email has left me quite moved, overwhelmed really. There is not a word for it.

First thought was, "Oh my, do I have some letters to write a few people!" Your example of holiness, honesty and courage is contagious, and I'll be drafting up a few letters to those who've pointed me to the good path along my life's journey.

Second thought was of the power of your spiritual and emotional journey that has brought you to this moment. In some ways, not even considering the content of any particular argument/point of view, the ability to look back, change and acknowledge it is a rare quality among us humans. I would like to think I, too, do this, but I flatter myself.

Third, your timing is liturgically impeccable! This Sunday's gospel is about the parable of seeds growing and we know not how. We must have faith to plant knowing we won't ever know, usually, about outcomes. Which gets me to your remembrance of sensing a harshness in my expressed conviction. I'm cautioned here about <u>how</u> we plant, that kindness and conviction can go hand in hand. No doubt the stress of that moment bled into my communications, and your memory here will help me also do better and be better. Thank you. And that seems hardly enough. But thank you.

Perhaps, as seems right to you, we might actually have a chat in the coming weeks. I imagine it will be a meaningful conversation! But let's follow up. It would be important to me.

The heart of meaning here is not the specific conflict – oh how may have intervened over the score of years following! But that the love of Christ must no know limit, and its proclamation can change us. I and we can think about the last time we changed our mind. It is better to be curious than judgmental. God's love is a curious* one

Music Music Music

Dear Friends,

It is time to inform you about the state of our music program. First, we owe Meg McKenna our gratitude for singlehandedly carrying the vocal portion of the services this past year-and-a-half, as well as Tricia Simpson-Curtin for accompanying Meg over several weeks. Second, after a long absence of any choral singing, we are finally planning a return of the choir this fall, in person. The Bach concert of Christmas 2019 was an example of true community music-making and was supposed to be just the first example of what we as a congregation are capable of before we were so rudely interrupted by the coronavirus. It is now time to pick up where we left off. Besides the resumption of weekly choral singing during services, we are aiming to hold a performance of J.S. Bach's Easter Oratorio around Eastertime of 2022, with orchestra, to be of comparable or greater scale than the Christmas 2019 concert. That requires us to start preparing now. The return of all who have sung in the choir in any capacity before is therefore eagerly expected. Moreover, we are also in need of new members, particularly male voices. There will be individual auditions after the conclusion of services on Sunday, September 12 for any prospective members who have not previously sung in the choir but are interested in joining. We will start with some simple warm-ups to determine your vocal range and finish with a passage or two from a piece of music. If you have ever harbored an interest in participating in our music program, now is the opportunity. If you cannot be present on the 12th but would still like to sing in the choir, please feel free to contact me directly. **Sunday**, September 19th will be the date of our first full choir rehearsal.

Another upcoming musical event at the church is my own solo concert on **Friday, November 19th** (exact time to be announced). The program will consist mostly of works by Beethoven. All are of course welcome, and please bring your family and friends! It will be largely the same program that I will be playing at the International Beethoven Competition in Bonn, Germany, held December 1-10. The rounds of the competition will certainly be live-streamed. I will share that information on my Facebook page when I have it myself. As always, I very much appreciate your listening and your support.

A vigorous music program being essential to the life, survival, and future thriving of our church, do not simply look to your neighbor to bear the standard. It is each person's responsibility to contribute. Whether you play an instrument or sing, all your talents can and should play a role in the rebuilding of our musical life. If you have never before participated in a choir or any other form of music group, do not let that stop you. My door is always open, so to speak; all ideas and people are welcome.

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Treasurer's Report

As of the end of July our financial results for 2021 were as follows:

A couple of notes regarding our finances:

Our revenue number is slightly high due to the fact that all prepaid 2021 pledges that were donated in 2020 are applied to the books in January. This amount is almost \$15,000. We also have several additional parishioners who have paid their entire 2021 pledge in the first 7 months of this year.

We applied for a second PPP loan in early March and were approved for \$20,210. On July 9th, we were approved for forgiveness on this second request. After consultation with our financial team, we will show both PPP loans appropriately in our statements.

Thank you to all who have supported Amazon Smile, donating a percentage of your purchases to CHS. In 2021, we have received almost \$500 in income (through mid-August).

Thank you to all for your continued support of CHS. Many of you have given of your time and talent, as well. We are especially blessed at CHS during these unpredictable days.

Tuesday Morning Bible Study

For a variety of reasons and circumstances, the reality of gathering to encounter the Scriptures has been a challenge. Some of those reasons and circumstances are beyond our control, but some are not. For instance, our pre-Covid 19 venue, The Spinning Wheel Diner, will not be reopening early enough for us to gather there (new time is 7:00am).

Yet, since we have a brand, sparkling new kitchen with a monster stove, why not take advantage of it by returning to fresh hot breakfasts at 6:00am on Tuesdays? The Lord knows, we have great coffee at least!

So those who can will meet at CHS beginning **October 5**th. We will continue meeting on Zoom exclusively in September.

I will be cooking up eggs and home fries. We will start in the kitchen with a hello and a first read and response to the given text assigned for the coming Sunday before sitting in the Narthex for our breakfast.

A few items:

Location Of course, many of you cannot attend in person -- Johnine being 1.5 hours away, for instance. We will have the laptop fired up and the zoom link active so you will have a choice.

Food To start, it'll be scrambled eggs and O'Brien potatoes. If you have allergies, you are encouraged to let me know and I will accommodate as possible. So, say you don't eat cheese, then I could easily serve some scrambled with and without it, for instance. No big deal.

Chef: No, I won't be the only one. One can imagine role assignments: clean-up, cook, supplies, etc. on a monthly rota, say. We will have back up—oatmeal and Parmalat or something for the expected last-moment allergy issue.

Conflicts: I don't care if we disagree, says St. Paul, because through debate the truth comes to light. But there are two types of conflict that can be approached differently:

- † <u>Content:</u> This is good and healthy. Since God chose not to make two snowflakes alike, there is not a reason in the Kingdom of God why any of us would need to agree on how we experience sacred text. Quoting my favorite movie, *Groundhog Day*, different is good. Different is blessed. Our goal is to discern the divine presence through the Word appointed, not to convince anyone of a more proper point of view. I'll be glad you are filled with excitement and enthusiasm about an insight. I will like that you like it.
- Process: We have a basic structure and expectation of how to approach the texts. A moderator formally anointed (Diane H. looking at you!) keeps us on track and refocuses us when off it. We've had our off-track moments for instance, the out-of-place political jab, or exposition well beyond the given text. And Diane H. has been very good about a refocus. Our lifeguard looking over us as we splash in the pool seems up to it. Plus, none of us are snowflakes about stuff, so it's best to trust we're up for it. And as St. Paul says, love bears all things. I'm bullish on our bearing capacity. We will send around a variation on our process format that helps us on the focus.

Bishop William "Chip" Stokes will reconfirm the whole congregation, including those teens and adults making their profession of faith and formally making their Confirmation.

From the Book of Common Prayer

The Renewal of Baptismal Vows commonly called Confirmation

The Bishop asks the candidates Do you reaffirm your renunciation of evil?

Candidate I do

Bishop Do you renew your commitment to Jesus Christ?

Candidate I do, and with God's grace I will follow him as my Savior and Lord.

After all have been presented, the Bishop addresses the congregation, saying

Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ?

People We will.

The Bishop then says these or similar words

Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

After all the crap we've been through with this pandemic and all the other upheavals, we need a moment – a moment of prayer and worship – to announce and declare again who we are and whose we are. The preparation for this declaration will occur in hybrid fashion, both in person and on the internet.

On Tuesday nights from 7:00-8:00 pm, beginning October 5 and ending December 14. We will use our Book of Common Prayer as resource with the guidance of Fr. Phil and friends.

Wednesday Small Group Meetings will be scheduled parish wide. We will be asking for volunteers to host small to medium groups in person and/or online. Dates set aside are October 20 and 27, November 3, 10, and 17, and December 1 and 8.

I'd like to chat in smaller groups about what's been going on in your lives, the challenges you have faced or are still facing, and your hopes for the months to come. Pundits keep talking about the past 18 months as an "unprecedented" time. I'd like to have some gentle, thoughtful conversations about what that has really meant to each of us, at all levels and life stages.
