

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From the Rector's Desk



"Should old acquaintance be forgot?"

Short answer: No! But. What do you mean by "acquaintance?"

The past months of pandemic have had us rely on technology to maintain some sort of community. But let's all admit community is thin. It is thin not because we don't care or because it wasn't real, or because it wasn't as important as we thought it was. Oh, no. Community is thin because life is thinner. Virtual life is not life, really. It's not the real thing. It may be what passes for life in this moment but it's life once removed. The only reason Zoom worship works at any level, if it does, is because we had the experience of worship previously. Community on the Internet is likewise impartial. It is not fraudulent, per se. But it's not the real deal. In the same way, social media friends are not friends. They're acquaintances. Friends will clean up after you're sick, drive you to the store, grieve with you over a loss, belly laugh over some shared silliness, celebrate a small victory, slap you in the face to help you wake up or correct a wrong. Acquaintances cannot be counted for any of this, regardless of how we might be cheered on by their postings and arguments to the causes one espouses.

Acquaintance is a medieval word from old French, and has the sense of making known. *Acointier* comes from Latin (but of course!). This verb root is cognition and joins ad-, "to," and cognoscere, "to come to know." It is distinct from the known friend. And its cousin gives that away: the word *quaint* is almost dismissive, "fine" and "neat." It started out meaning "crafty," and "ingenious," and has evolved to "odd" and now, it is mostly an insult of being "old-fashioned." Well, call me quaint, but no acquaintance. There's a point here. I wander down the etymological byway to get to an idea that we might consider this Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany in the midst of a raging, unacceptably out-of-control pandemic.

We can survive and even grow in this moment if we come to welcome the divine presence as no mere acquaintance but a known friend. We can find a deeper place in our hearts as our faith moves from being quaint, something fine and neat, and sinks deeply into our souls and hearts and minds as a Grace, a Fulfillment, a Companion, a Hope. While this pandemic moment has us making lesser substitutes for the real thing, we might want to have our spiritual expectations properly in place. Those expectations, especially in this church-time of Advent expectation, are grounded in the most real of all things, a Saving Grace. I invite you to the deep. Together.

So sing of old acquaintances on New Year's Eve and even relish the folks you find of like mind on the Internet. Perhaps make a momentary peace with the thinness of remote worship. But make no mistake, the realness of your Friend is ever present. Go to the deep place with Christ. Though we as a Body are apart, nothing can ever separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Thank you to those who have been able to keep current with their giving. We are grateful for all of your continued support during these difficult times.

A couple of notes regarding our finances:

- † This report includes adjustments in our budget for some income line items due to the decreased use of our building and adjusted pledge commitments.
- † Upon the urging of the Diocese we applied for and received \$29,200 in PPP funds. Our understanding is any loan under \$50,000 will be forgiven. We are awaiting the paperwork to fill out to formally ask for the loan forgiveness.
- † Once we know that the PPP loan has been forgiven, our net number should be trending positive.
- † Our Christmas offerings help each year. As you are able, please remember CHS during this holiday time by returning the Christmas special envelope that will be sent out in December.

Thank you to all parishioners who added CHS as their charity in the Amazon Smile program. We continue to receive monthly distributions from Amazon as a percentage of items purchased.

Giving Tree (Tree of Jesse)

“A shoot will spring forth from the stump of Jesse, and a branch out of his roots” — Isaiah 11:1.

Jesse was King David’s father. The image of a branch growing out of the roots of Jesse points to a new king in David’s line. We know that this is fulfilled in Jesus, the King of Kings, who is a descendant of Jesse.

During the Advent season, a symbolic Branch of Jesse would normally decorate our Narthex [see photo page 1]. Because of the pandemic, the Giving Branch is virtual this year. The Branch is a representation that connects God’s faithfulness through the Old Testament to the newness in the form of the birth of Jesus. Just as God gave us the gift of life through Jesus Christ, we will share this hope with others in our community through the giving of Christmas gifts.

In lieu of wrapped gifts this year, \$25 gift cards will be provided for our friends at Freedom House (a half-way house for men) and their Family Afterward program, Good News Home (a drug/alcohol abuse treatment center for women), Anderson House (a half-way house for women), Cristo Rey, and Binnacle House (a group home for boys ages 13-18). In order to provide these gifts, we are asking for monetary donations. With these funds, we will purchase 125 gift cards and distribute them to the recipients.

Monetary donations can be made via check, cash, or PayPal. Please note "Giving Branch" on the check or on the envelope (if donating cash). There is a secure black box outside the Church office for anyone wanting to drop off a contribution, or it can be mailed to the Church. If donating through PayPal, please follow the link on the CHS website and note "Giving Branch" on the item ID or note line.

Christmas Communion Pyx

A pyx is not only a great Scrabble word, but an object that will be hand delivered to every home in the parish this month.. It's a small container for holding the reserved Sacrament when bringing Communion to people in hospital or in their homes. From Dec 12th through the 20th, look for a gift bag dropped off at door; it will contain the pyx with reserved

Sacrament, a service leaflet for the Christmas services, and the formal Christmas Letter and greeting we normally send each year.

From the earliest centuries of the Church, given the many plagues and persecutions, there have been many ways to deliver Communion to the faithful. On Maundy Thursday, the day we celebrate the institution of the Lord's Supper during Holy Week, it was the custom of area Bishops to provide blessed bread to all parish clergy so that every church celebrated that evening from the same loaf. Monks and hermits living in prayerful isolation would come into a village to receive a month's worth of Sacrament to take with them as they went back into the wilderness. So in this historic fashion we are distributing the consecrated host to everyone ahead of our Christmas services.

Since it is very likely our services on Christmas will be remote, given the surge in our plague, we are planning for you to participate at home where you are. Every pyx will be broken pieces of whole larger concelebration wafers, as a sign that we are all one Body. We will ensure enough of the host is available and you may feel free to break it up even further given your local circumstance. Additionally, enough consecrated Sacrament will be supplied, so that throughout the 12 Days of Christmas, you may choose to regularly receive Holy Communion. Instructions with additional prayers are provided in each gift bag. Going forward, we will invite you for the remainder of the pandemic to drive into the parking lot at the church to collect more at scheduled times- though it will also be provided during the house blessings [see article page 14. We expect you will store your pyx in the special place where you pray or keep holy things in your home.

Drivers Requested: We have 15 routes set up for house blessings during the Epiphany season and proposed delivering the Christmas gifts along those same routes. We need 15 drivers, with helpers if available. You will be offered a route – more than one if you have the time. Distribution should take place between December 12th and 20th. It takes up to a few hours for each route. Please send a note to the church if you are willing (social distancing and masks apply, of course).

A Special Christmas Treat: Sunday 12/20; 7:00 pm

Our own Ricky Waller will be live streaming a dramatic reading of the classic *'Twas the Night Before Christmas*. Some brief carols and other songs will be included. We recommend you join in your pajamas with some hot cocoa (or any other warm beverage to your liking).

Winter Solstice — Monday, December 21; 8:00 pm

On the day of longest shadow and shortest light, we offer a service of hope amidst struggle. Available on Zoom and Facebook Live. (Check the website or CHS News for the links).

Homily by Deacon Dot: Christ the King, November 22, 2020

In today's Gospel reading from Matthew (25: 31-46), we get to the separation of the sheep and the goats. It's not difficult to understand — we get it, loud and clear. Love your neighbor, love your King.

What makes it difficult is our interpretation. This simple parable becomes all too difficult for us because our human minds frame it in terms of "cause and effect." If you do THIS, then THAT happens. We just want to know, "What must I do to be saved?"

But Jesus isn't quite speaking that way. He's not really answering that question. He describes the Son of Man, the Messiah Himself, coming like a King. This King comes in all His glory. Angels surround Him—ALL the angels, it says. And all people are brought before Him, and the separating begins.

How does the separating happen? He doesn't exactly say how it happens...it just happens. Sheep to His right—at the hand of mercy. Goats to His left—the hand of judgment. When we look at the Son of Man's separating of the sheep and goats, they don't become sheep or goats by His judgment. He's simply identifying them for what they really are. It's all about identity.

And we see this play out as the King speaks to these two groups. To the sheep He says, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." "You who are blessed," He says.

To the goats He says, "Depart from me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels." The sheep are blessed, the goats are cursed. To understand why the sheep are blessed, we need to look at why the goats are cursed. Look at the nature of their punishment. "Depart from Me," says the King. It's separation from God Himself. Eternal separation. A separation "into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels."

But the sheep...the sheep are blessed by God. And who does Jesus say are the blessed ones? He says, "Blessed are the poor in spirit," those who mourn;" the meek," those who hunger and thirst for righteousness," the merciful...the pure in heart...the peacemakers," those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake," and "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you."

The sheep—the blessed ones—are the Church, the baptized people of God. We have been blessed through our Baptisms. We are blessed through the hearing of the Word. We are blessed through the Spirit's continual work in our sanctified life. We are blessed because we are the Church. We are blessed because we have been claimed by God—bought with the blood of Jesus, brought into His family.

We were once goats, but by grace through faith, we have already been made sheep, and placed into His sheepfold. We are sheep because we are no longer separated from God the Father. So, "Come, you who are blessed by the Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

It's all about identity. Our identity in Christ. We can't do anything to make ourselves sheep, yet we give evidence to the fact that we are sheep. We are blessed. And now, Jesus calls us to act like it. To go out and serve "the least of these." That's just what sheep do. That's what the blessed do. That's what the Church does. We go out and serve. We love our neighbor, and when we do, we also love our King. For, as Jesus said, "as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me."

The point Jesus makes is the sheep just serve, regardless. In fact, it's precisely because they serve without expecting reward; without realizing who they are serving, that proves they're sheep. We don't love our neighbor in order to love our King. We love our neighbor because we love our King.

We aren't called to serve others because we think they're worthy. We're called to serve others because Christ thought them worthy of dying for. We're called to serve others because Christ thought us worth dying for. The King of kings is everywhere. The least of these are everywhere. Who are the least of these?

It's the couple who so desperately want to have children but are, for unknown reasons, unable to. It's the alcoholic in the family who doesn't know how to stop; or the girl who just one time got pulled over for having a few too many drinks. It's the family who can't afford insurance, but desperately need the healthcare for their little girl. It's the divorced man whose marriage fell apart because his job became his "mistress." Or the guy who virtually walks out on his wife and family every time he goes online, and he just can't help himself. It's the refugee fleeing from a world of war, but bringing with her baggage as she walks into a world of stigma and stereotypes. It's the kid at school who dresses in old hand-me-downs, who always seems to be untidy; the one who seems to be uninterested in the work the teacher gives, preoccupied with things at home. It's the woman looking for her next "fix" after becoming addicted to opiates after surgery. It's the elderly woman whose mind isn't what it used to be, and some days this makes her hard to get along with. These, and more—they are "the least of these" Jesus talks about. And He calls us, the sheep, to action. To reach out in love and mercy.

We are all sheep, yes. But we are all the least of these, too. Because, let's face it, some days we just don't feel like we're "blessed." Some days, it's all we can do to put up the façade as we sit here in the pew, or on Zoom, trying to make it look like we've got it together. Some days, we just don't feel like we're part of the flock, as if we've wandered too far, this time, and there's nothing we can do. But it's in these moments we need to remember that we can't make ourselves sheep. But God in Christ has. Remember, our identity is not in what we do, but in what Christ has done, and who He has made us to be. Our King has died for us; He rose for us, and for all the least of these.

He promises to come back for us — for even the least of His sheep. And He will say, "Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." Until that day, continue to live like a sheep. Until that day, continue to live that blessed life—because He has called us blessed, even when we don't feel like it.

Until He returns on the last day, BE the church.

Love your neighbor, love your King.

Amen.






